# NSU COE Alumni Spotlight Kelli Buck

School Counselor at Darnaby Elementary in Union Public Schools M.S. Counseling, 2015

The College of Education is proud to feature alumni in each newsletter who have positively impacted his/her community and field of study.

In this issue, we are honored to introduce Kelli Buck, School Counselor. The teachers at Darnaby Elementary nominated Kelly to be the "teacher of the year" in 2018 for her work in providing a comprehensive school counseling program to her students where all students received Tier 1 services. These services reduced classroom referrals, increased attendance, and helped students achieve more. Kelly learned about developing a comprehensive school counseling program during her graduate training and applied it to her school. This year, she has also applied to the Oklahoma State Board of Behavioral Health to peruse her Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) candidacy.

"The counseling program at Northeastern State University provided me with essential coursework and skilled professors who advanced my knowledge and skill set in the counseling field. NSU has fostered partnerships with agencies and educational settings that allowed me to have internship experiences with agencies such as CREOKS Behavioral Health Services at Spring Creek Recovery Center and Union Public Schools. My experience and application during my internships have paved the way for my current career path in the counseling field as an Elementary School Counselor. The supervision and guidance I received from Northeastern University deepened my passion and respect for the counseling profession. The program has given me the opportunity to teach, model, and implement essential Social Emotional Learning skills and programing for kids Pre-Kindergarten to Fifth Grade. The program also taught me the skills necessary to collaborate with teachers, education professionals, stakeholders, families, and community partners as well as advocate for all students to have an equitable education and access to the resources and tools necessary to foster social, emotional, and academic success."

## Jonathan Herrick Graduate Student B.S. HHP, 2019



The College of Education is also honored to introduce Jonathan Herrick. He graduated with Magna Cum Laude with a BS in Health and Human Performance in 2019 and will graduate with his Master's degree in Athletic Training from Oklahoma State University in May 2021. Jonathan has been successful in his athletic career, including serving as the captain for the McAlester High School football team in 2015. He was awarded the Burlsworth Character Award in 2016 and was a part of the Rho Theta Sigma chapter at NSU.

Johathan is currently working on a research about Early Therapeutic Exercise versus Rest, Ice, Compression, and Elevation in the acute treatment of lateral ankle sprains. For Athletic Trainers, ankle sprains are one of the most common injuries seen during a season. His research has shown that the earlier therapeutic exercise is implemented after an ankle sprain occurs the quicker the athlete is able to functionally return to play. This research has the potential to impact communities and sports medicine.

# COE Department Updates



<u>Curriculum and Instruction</u>: Faculty/Staff updates: Dr. Reed is the new department chair for C & I (since January 2020). Donna Davis is the new Secretary. Rhea Fears is the new Clinical Education Director. Dr. Ingrid Massey is the new Reading Clinic Director for Broken Arrow. Dr. Sophia Sweeney and Tonya Garrett are teaching Elementary Education courses for the ELED Program. Dr. Sarah Ramsey is the new Reading Program Chair. Kristin Korte is a new Instructor for the Special Education Program. Curriculum updates: The Early Childhood Program has a completely online graduate degree available. The Special Education Program has an accelerated degree option. Students admitted to the Accelerated B.S.Ed. Special Education-Mild/Moderate Disorders to M.Ed. Special Education-Autism Spectrum Disorders degree program will complete 8 hours of graduate level credit to apply toward both the undergraduate and graduate degrees.

Educational Leadership: The Department of Educational Leadership continues to move forward during the pandemic. The overall enrollment in all four programs for the department was up this fall which is encouraging to see during somewhat difficult times this year. The department faculty and staff want to congratulate Dr. Susan Frusher who retired in the spring with more than 30 years working for NSU. She helped to build the M.S. in Leadership into what it is today. Remaining faculty continue to work with courses and have made adjustments to do advising for candidates through remote environments this fall semester. There is still research occurring among the faculty as many were invited to make presentations in Oklahoma and around the country until the pandemic cancelled many educational conferences. Congratulations go out to Dr. Maria Gray (Christian) who was awarded tenure and promotion to associate professor at the end of last year.

Health and Kinesiology: H & K offers the Master of Science in Health and Sports Science with two options (i.e., Health Education option and Sport Administration/Management option) from fall 2020. Former undergraduate student, Janilee Emerson, moved to the Master of Occupational Therapy program at NSU. Former undergraduate student, Ryan Schwab, moved to Doctorate of Physical Therapy at OU. Former undergraduate student, Wren Makayla, was hired as a physical education teacher at Elementary school in Springdale, AR. Former graduate student, Jeananne Hearon, was hired for teaching HHP classes at OSU-Tulsa.

Psychology and Counseling: Dr Ashlee Hurst is collaborating with faculty from OSU on a study named, "*Women's Aggressive and Hormonal Response to Relationship Threats from Friends and Non-Friends*." Both Dr Hurst and Dr. April Phillips have student researchers accepted for a presentation at the Society for Personality and Social Psychology conference to be held in Feb. Dr J. M. Kirk has three student research teams' projects accepted to the Southwest Psychological Association conference in March 2021. Laura Hix, a BS in Psychology graduate, has been accepted into an online graduate program at Harvard and is currently trying to raise money to cover her costs for the program. ### Opening

On Oct. 1, the College of Education celebrated the latest milestone of its flagship engagement program with a ribbon cutting for its new location and the announcement of a new name more reflective of its future vision. Since its founding in 2012 as a collaborative effort between NSU's College of Education and the Cherokee Nation, the Race Academy of Critical Engagement has continued to expand—adding classrooms and STEAM maker labs on multiple campuses, graduating more than 2,000 teachers from the program, and serving more than 10,000 PK-12 students.

From its new location, the 20+ room Special Services building located behind Bagley Hall, the program will now go beyond Summer Youth Academies to offer after school programs, maker classes for the community, as well as NSU faculty and staff, and professional development for NSU future and master's teachers. The expansion includes not only more robotics and larger maker spaces, but additional opportunities to discover and explore the arts, astronomy, podcasting, virtual reality, quilting, gardening, butterfly and bee sanctuaries and many other experiences. The newly named Innovation & Discovery Education Academy, led by Barbara Fuller, looks forward to many new initiatives to serve the NSU community and its communities at large.
