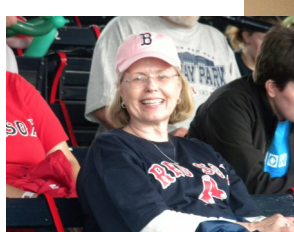

The majority of people go into teaching in the classroom but not all. Some graduates work in social service agencies that monitor early care facilities. Others work for non-profits that serve children and families. Some of our graduates wanted to see the world and are currently teaching on far away military bases. Finally, some early childhood graduates continue their education and get a master's degree and PhD.

Advice for students → Do not rush through the program!

It is tempting to want to hurry along and get out into the classroom as soon as possible. Unfortunately, when we hurry, we often miss the important moments along the way. Be kind to yourself and take the time to process what you are learning.

Tips on How to Connect with Professors

- ✓ **Attend their office hours** → It may seem intimidating to stop by a professor's office, but office hours are the time they set aside specifically to visit with them outside of class. Office hours are posted on their doors, in syllabi, or you can request via email.
- ✓ **Go to class** → **Always be prepared** → **Participate** → **Display respect**
- ✓ **Get involved** → Ask your professors about any organization/honor societies to join. Professors often sponsor these, so it is another great way to get more connected to them.
- ✓ **Ask them questions** → How did they get into their field? Were they ever lost college students? What can you do with your major? What can you do to prepare for life after graduation? The sky is the limit!
