The majority of people go into teaching in the classroom but not all. Some graduates work in social service agencies that monitor early care

facilities. Others work for non-profits that serve children and families. Some of our graduates wanted to see the world and and are currently teaching on far away military bases. Finally, some early childhood graduates continue their education and get a master's degree and PhD. **Advice for students** → Do not rush through the program!

It is tempting to want to hurry along and get out into the classroom as soon as possible. Unfortunately, when we hurry, we often miss the important moments along the way. Be kind to yourself and take the time to process what you are learning.
