Who had the biggest impact on your educational experience?

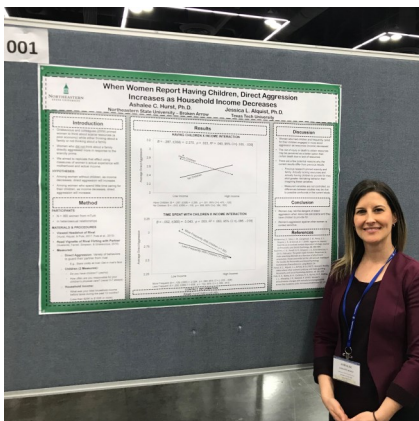
My mentors.

Tips on How to Connect with Professors

- ✓ **Introduce yourself** → Whether it's after class or via email, introducing yourself is a great first step to connecting with professors.
- ✓ **Attend their office hours** → It may seem intimidating to stop by a professor's office, but office hours are the time they set aside specifically to visit with them outside of class. Office hours are posted on their doors, in syllabi, or you can request via email.
- ✓ **Go to class** → **Always be prepared** → **Participate** → **Display respect**
- ✓ **Get involved** → Ask your professors about any organization/honor societies to join. Professors often sponsor these, so it is another great way to get more connected to them.
- ✓ **Ask them questions** → How did they get into their field? Were they ever lost college students? What can you do with your major? What can you do to prepare for life after graduation? The sky is the limit!
